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ABOUT COVENANT

Covenant Classical School of Fort Worth is a K-12, independent, interdenominational, classical Christian school founded in 1999. Located in the diverse and culturally-robust community of Fort Worth, Covenant occupies a 54-acre campus with 470 students. Grades 7-8 make up the School of Logic and grades 9-12 make up the School of Rhetoric. Our mission is to train students to live and reason from a Christ-centered worldview. Our classical method is rooted in the Trivium: the grammar, logic, and rhetoric of all subjects. Students trained in this way are equipped with tools for the effective accumulation, synthesis, and communication of knowledge.

PORTRAIT OF A GRADUATE

Our goals are that each Covenant graduate love God; love others; reason wisely; love learning; engage culture; use the tools of learning, thinking, and expression; embody virtue, and delight in beauty.

FACULTY

The student to faculty ratio is 11:1. The majority of our Logic/Rhetoric faculty holds a master's degree or higher. Covenant encourages faculty to pursue advanced degrees and graduate coursework that enhance the Covenant curriculum.

ACCREDITATION & MEMBERSHIP

Covenant is accredited through Cognia and is a member of the Society for Classical Learning, the Texas Private Schools Association (TPSA), Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools (TAPPS), and the Texas Association for College Admission and Counseling (TACAC).

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Students are selectively admitted after demonstrating grade-level competency on entrance exams in reading comprehension and analysis, composition, Latin, and math. Recommendations are required, and students and parents are interviewed to ensure a commitment to rigorous academics and Christian character.

THE COVENANT DISTINCTIVE

Covenant's classical Christian education is built on a foundation of Latin, logic, integrated liberal arts, and accelerated math and science that is tailored to the student's K-12 stages of development. In each grade, students are taught how to learn, equipping them to live the examined life of critical thinking and reflection.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE

Latin instruction begins in 3rd grade. Students complete a formal study of Latin grammar in 9th grade, then choose to continue their study of Advanced Latin or begin a study of Greek in 10th grade. All Latin students take the National Latin Exam and some take the AP Latin Test. Likewise, all Greek students take the National Greek Exam.

MATH & SCIENCE

Students are on an accelerated track of math and science. Algebra I is taken in 8th grade. Beginning with the freshmen class of 2021-2022, students will take their science courses in this order: Physics, Biology, Chemistry and Anatomy and Physiology.

HISTORY & LITERATURE

Covenant students read and research source documents and original writings. By integrating history, literature, philosophy, theology, art, and music throughout all disciplines, our students see the world as a whole system and a work of art rather than as disjointed groups of facts. School of Logic students read complete ancient texts from Gilgamesh and Genesis to Plato and Virgil. Rhetoric level students continue into the medieval to modern eras, reading and interacting with thinkers from Augustine to Marx and C. S. Lewis.

LOGIC & RHETORIC

CCS trains students how to reason, understand arguments, and persuade winsomely. School of Logic students complete two years of formal logic.

SENIOR THESIS

After two semesters of rhetoric, each senior must research, write, present, and defend an 18-20 page persuasive thesis in order to graduate. The oral defense before an academic panel is public.

HONORS CLASSES

All CCS courses are taught at the honors level, with most utilizing freshmen-level college texts.

COVID-19

During the "Shelter in Place" order from the City of Fort Worth due to the COVID-19 pandemic, CCS maintained its rigorous academic instruction via interactive online lectures, Zoom conference calls, projects, assignments, and assessments throughout the spring semester of 2020. While we adapted our curriculum to account for the pedagogical shift required of an online platform, student work was collected, recorded, evaluated and assigned an appropriate numerical grade – not Pass/Fail – according to our regular, established standards. Since the fall of 2020, instruction has been in person.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Athletics include cross country, volleyball, six-man football, track, basketball, baseball, tennis, and golf. Other student activities include the Great Books Scholars Program, Mock Trial, theatre productions, yearbook, and various art shows and competitions.

SERVICE

All K-12 Covenant students, parents, and teachers annually partner with local charitable organizations to help residents improve their lives. Students work in community garden, on widows' homes, in church remodeling projects, and with senior centers. Community service is an integral part of student life at Covenant.
